

Australian Track Cycling Championships

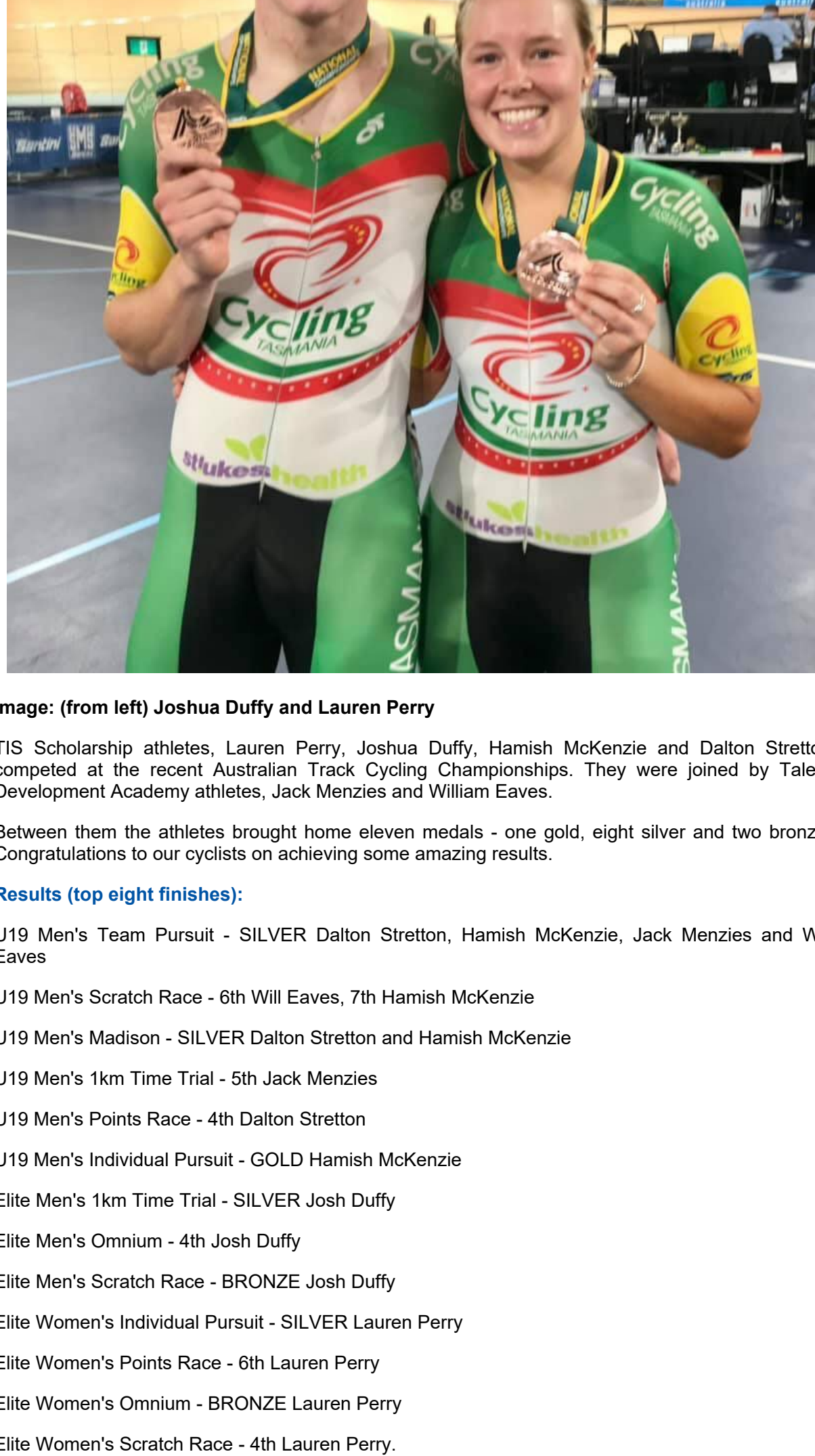

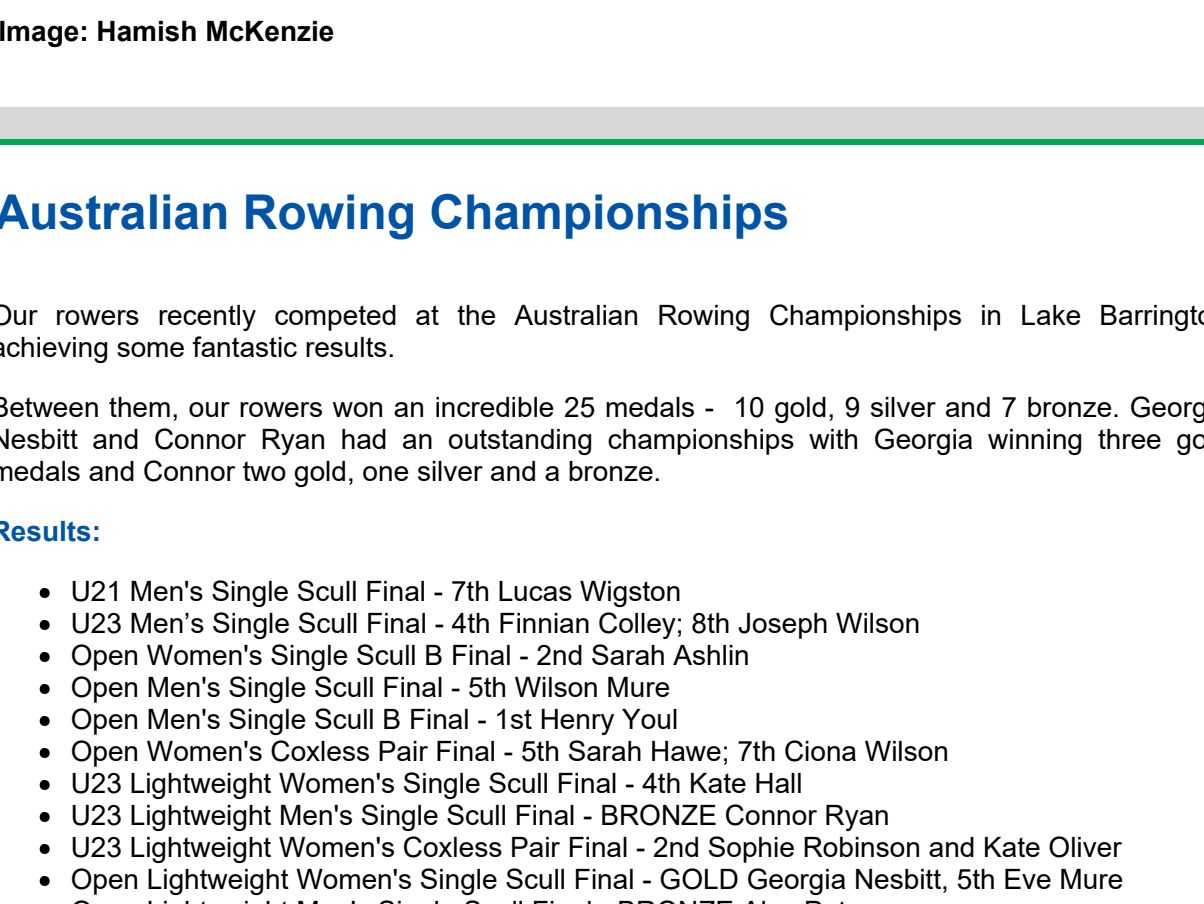

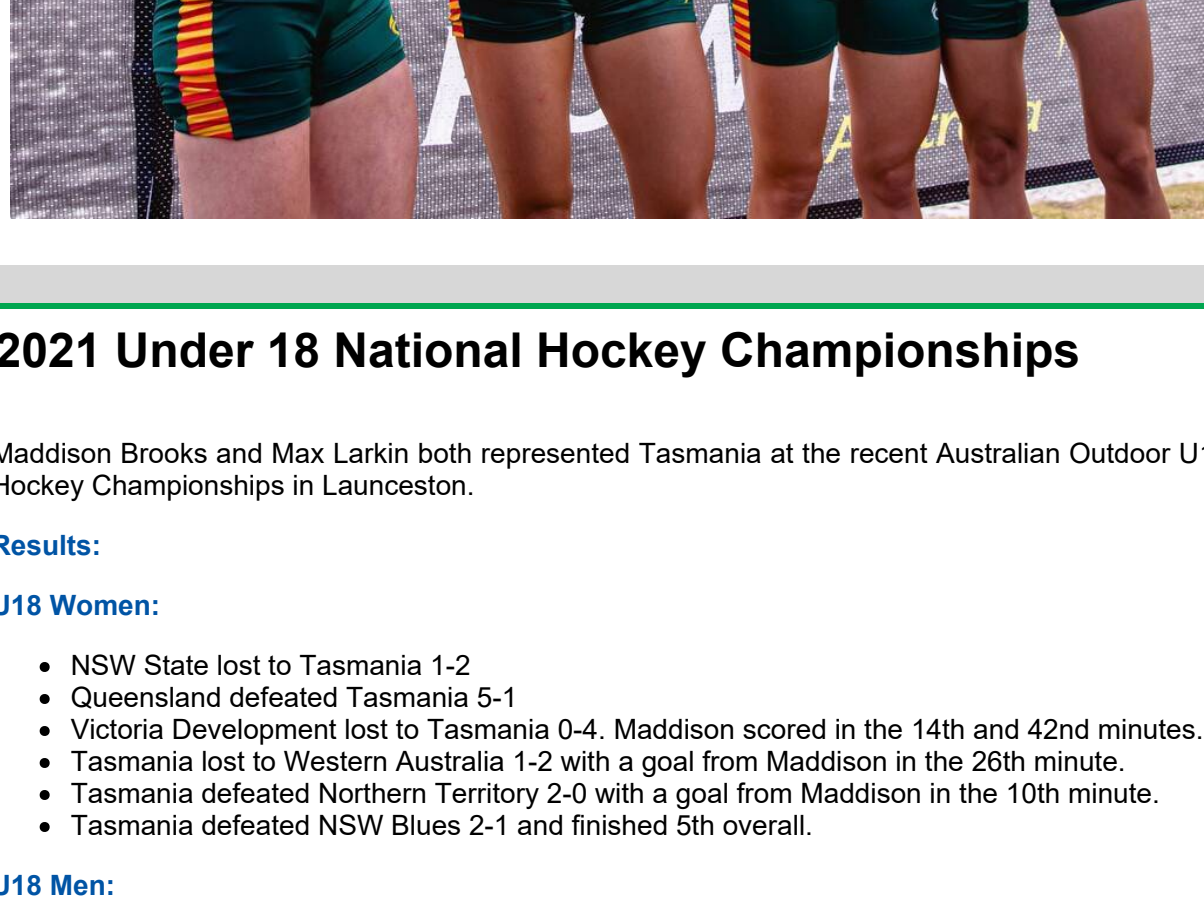

Maddison Brooks and Max Larkin both represented Tasmania at the recent Australian Outdoor U18 Hockey Championships in Launceston.

Results:

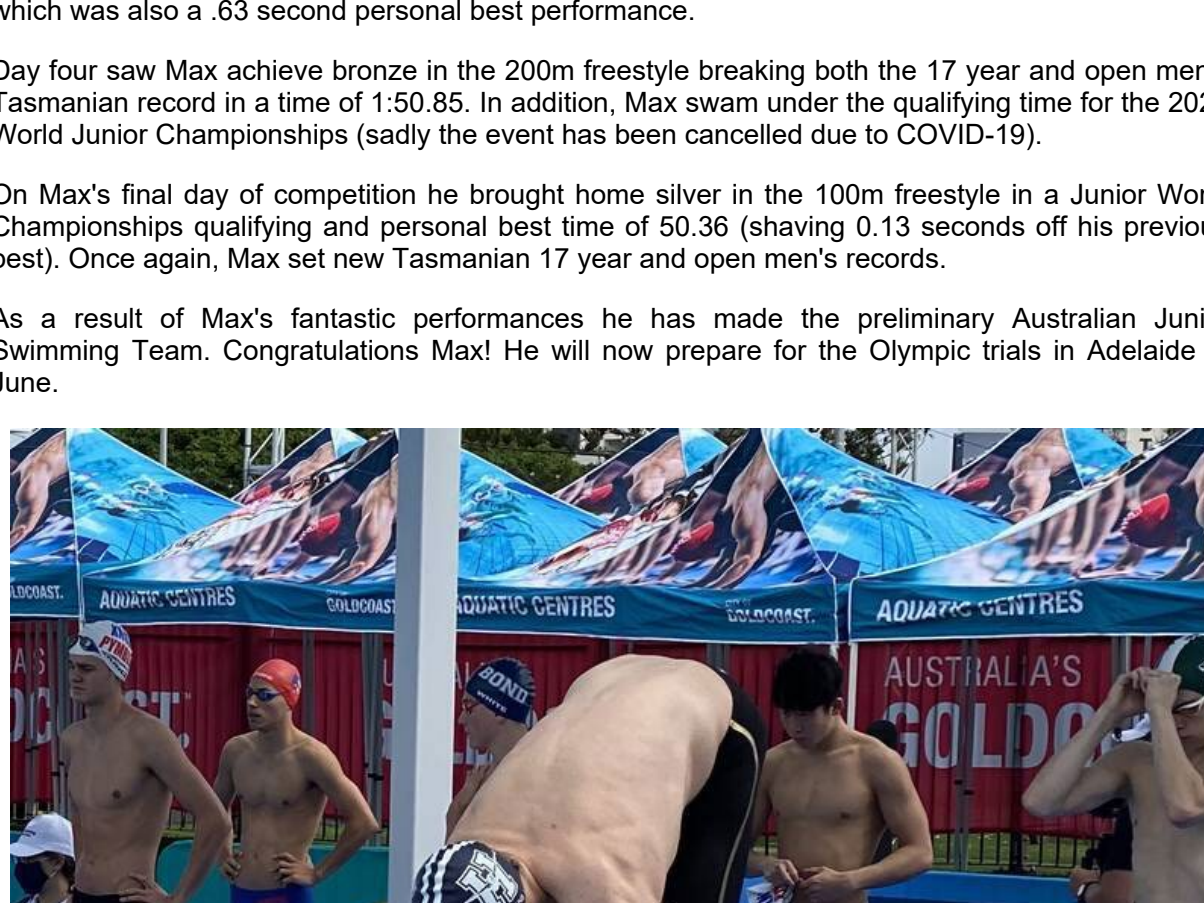
U18 Women:

- NSW State lost to Tasmania 1-2
- Queensland defeated Tasmania 5-1
- Victoria Development lost to Tasmania 0-4. Maddison scored in the 14th and 42nd mins.
- Tasmania lost to Western Australia 1-2 with a goal from Maddison in the 26th minute.
- Tasmania defeated Northern Territory 2-0 with a goal from Maddison in the 10th minute.
- Tasmania defeated NSW Blues 2-1 and finished 5th overall.

U18 Men:

- Tasmania lost to Northern Territory 1-4
- Tasmania lost to ACT 2-3
- Tasmania lost to Queensland 0-3
- NSW Blue lost to Tasmania 0-3
- Tasmania drew with Victoria 0-0
- Tasmania defeated Victoria Development in a 3-1 shoot-out to finish 7th overall.

2021 Australian Age Swimming Championships

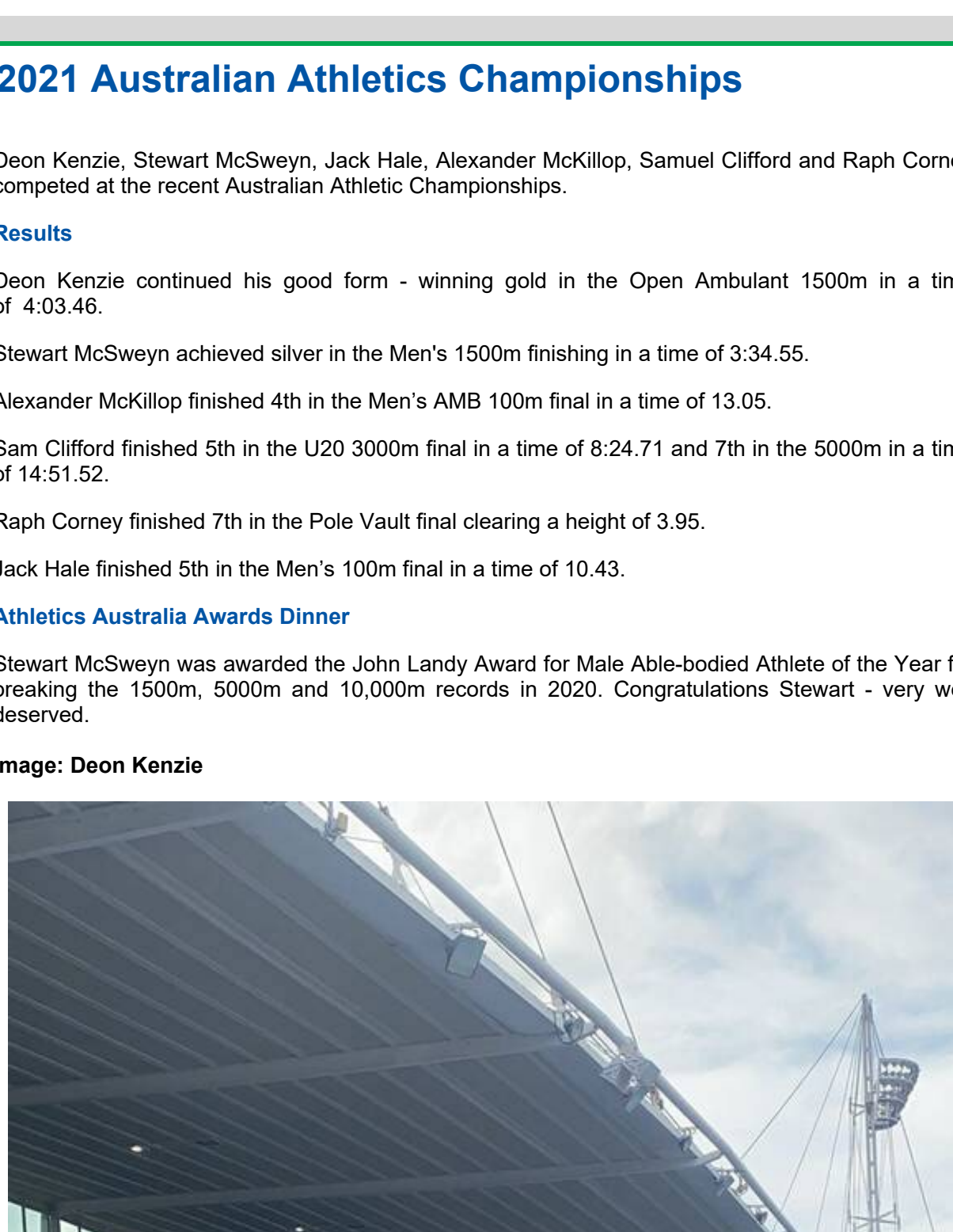
Max Giuliani had an amazing National Championships campaign.

On day three Max broke the men's 17 year Tasmanian 50 metre freestyle record in a time of 23.73. This was also a .63 second personal best performance.

Day four saw Max achieve bronze in the 200m freestyle breaking both the 17 year and open men's Tasmanian record in a time of 1:50.85. In addition, Max swam under the qualifying time for the 2021 World Junior Championships (sadly the event has been cancelled due to COVID-19).

On Max's final day of competition he broke home silver in the 100m freestyle in a Junior World Championships qualifying and personal best time of 50.36 (shaving 0.13 seconds off his previous best). Once again, Max set new Tasmanian 17 year and open men's records.

As a result of Max's fantastic performances he has made the preliminary Australian Junior Swimming Team. Congratulations Max! He will now prepare for the Olympic trials in Adelaide in June.



2021 Australian Athletics Championships

Deon Kenzie, Stewart McSweyn, Jack Hale, Alexander McKillop, Samuel Clifford and Raph Corney competed at the recent Australian Athletic Championships.

Results

Deon Kenzie continued his good form - winning gold in the Open Ambulant 1500m in a time of 4:03.46.

Stewart McSweyn achieved silver in the Men's 1500m finishing in a time of 3:34.55.

Alexander McKillop finished 4th in the Men's AMB 100m final in a time of 13.05.

Sam Clifford finished 5th in the U20 3000m final in a time of 8:24.71 and 7th in the 5000m in a time of 14:51.52.

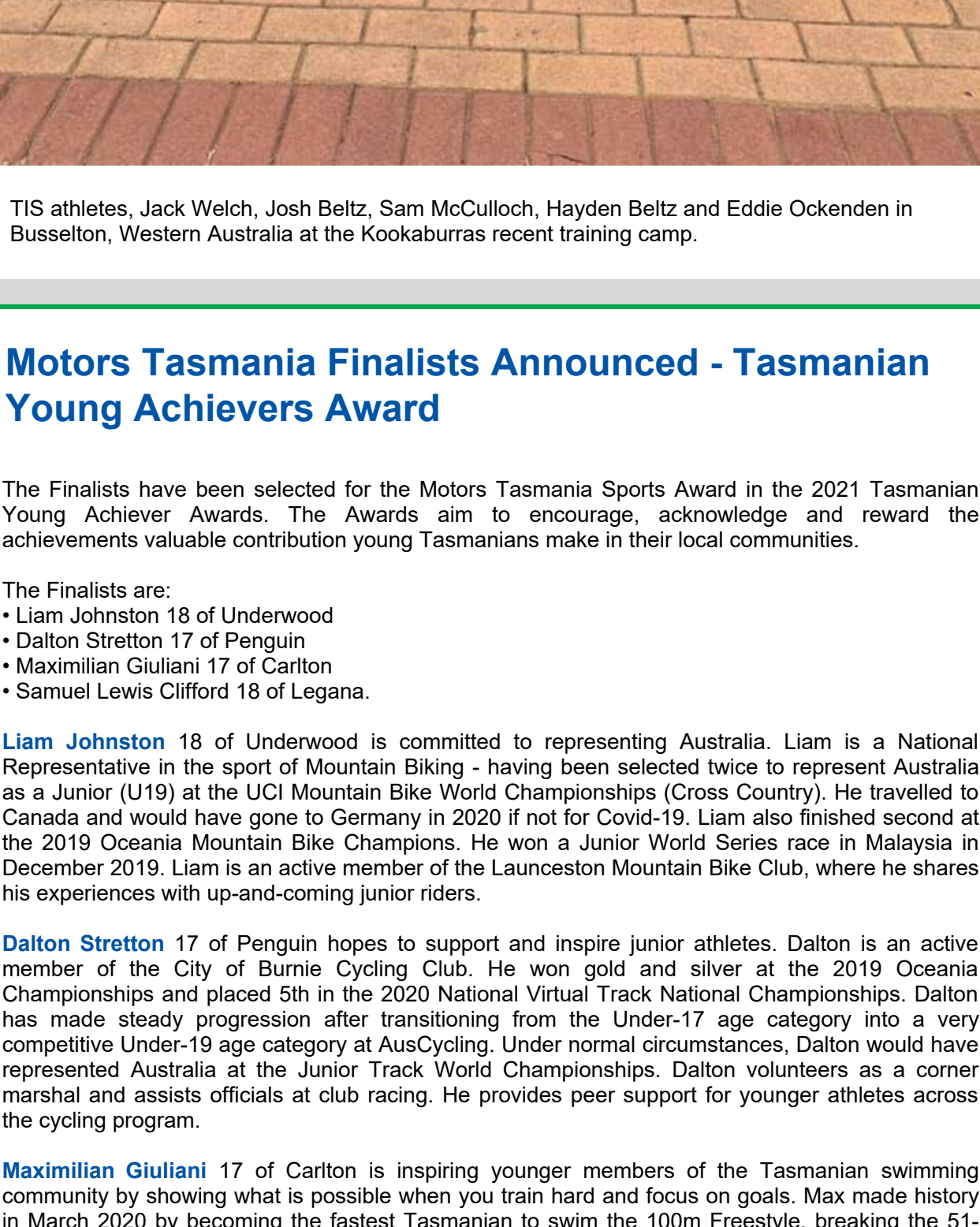
Raph Corney finished 7th in the Pole Vault final clearing a height of 3.95.

Jack Hale finished 5th in the Men's 100m final in a time of 10.43.

Motors Tasmania Finalists Announced - Tasmanian Young Achievers Award

The Finalists have been selected for the Motors Tasmania Sports Award in the 2021 Tasmanian Young Achievers Awards. The Awards aim to encourage, acknowledge and reward the achievements of valuable contribution young Tasmanians make in their local communities.

The Finalists are:

- Liam Johnston 18 of Underwood
- Dalton Stretton 17 of Penguin
- Maximilian Giuliani 17 of Carlton
- Samuel Lewis Clifford 18 of Legana.

Liam Johnston 18 of Underwood is committed to representing Australia. Liam is a National Representative in the sport of Mountain Biking - having been selected twice to represent Australia as a Junior (U19) at the UCI Mountain Bike World Championships (Cross Country). He travelled to Canada and would have gone to Germany in 2020 if not for Covid-19. Liam also finished second at the 2019 Oceania Mountain Bike Champions. He won a Junior World Series race in Malaysia in December 2019. Liam is an active member of the Launceston Mountain Bike Club, where he shares his experiences with up-and-coming junior riders.

Dalton Stretton 17 of Penguin hopes to support and inspire junior athletes. Dalton is an active member of the City of Burnie Cycling Club. He won gold and silver at the 2019 Oceania Championships and placed 5th in the 2020 National Virtual Track National Championships. Dalton has made steady progression after transitioning from the Under-17 age category into a very competitive Under-19 age category at AusCycling. Under normal circumstances, Dalton would have represented Australia at the Junior Track World Championships. Dalton volunteers as a corner marshal and assists officials at club racing. He provides peer support for younger athletes across the cycling region.

Maximilian Giuliani 17 of Carlton is inspiring younger members of the Tasmanian swimming community by showing what is possible when you train hard and focus on goals. Max made history in March 2020 by becoming the fastest Tasmanian to swim the 100m Freestyle, breaking the 51-second barrier. He made the Swimming Australia's MLC National Flippers Squad in December 2020 and attended a camp on the Gold Coast. Max is on track to making the Junior World Championships Team in July. He is the only Tasmanian swimmer with a Tasmanian Institute of Sport High Performance Scholarship, with access to a strength and conditioning coach and gym each week.

Samuel Lewis Clifford 18 of Legana is a promising young athlete in a highly competitive sport. Samuel ranked number one in Australia for the U20 5000m in 2020 and would have competed in the Junior World Championships had it not been for Covid-19. In March 2019, Samuel was the fastest Australian in 10 years at the U20 World Cross Country Championships in Denmark. In July 2019 at the Victorian Championships, he broke the Australian U18 record in the 5000m race. In August 2020, he won 1st place in the Tasmanian Open Cross Country Championships in the 10km category. Samuel is on track to go to the Junior World Championship in 2021.

Tasmania has a proud and rich history of World Class success on the International sporting stage. Admired for their talent, commitment and dedication in pursuit of excellence; the Motors Tasmania Sports award aims to recognise outstanding performances of young Tasmanian athletes at International Junior, Youth or under 23 class level. In recognising their achievements, the Motors Tasmania Sports Award also acknowledges the athlete's contribution to their sport and the Tasmanian sporting community.

The Finalists will be presented and Winners announced at an Awards Gala Presentation Dinner to

be held at Wrest Point on Friday 14 May 2021. One of the ten category winners will be chosen as the 2021 Tasmanian Young Achiever of the Year and will receive an additional \$2,000 and a State trophy from the Tasmanian Government.

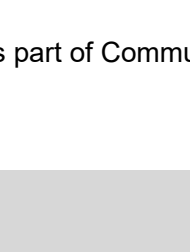
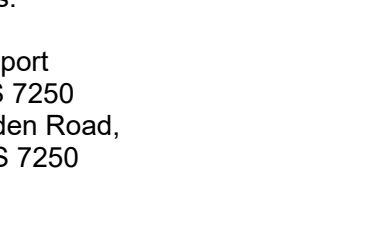
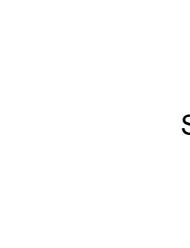
